

The Association of the Jewish Historical Institute in Poland has been active since 1951, working to commemorate the history and culture of Polish Jews and their contribution to global culture.

The Association supports numerous projects carried out in cooperation with the POLIN Museum of the History of Polish Jews, the Emanuel Ringelblum Jewish Historical Institute, and local community activists, while also running its own Grant Program.

Our organization has assembled some of the largest collections in the world related to the history of Polish Jews, including archival materials, library holdings, as well as numerous works of art and objects of artistic craftsmanship. Among the most valuable is the Underground Archive of the Warsaw Ghetto, known as the Ringelblum Archive, inscribed on UNESCO's Memory of the World Register.

The Association is made up of members from diverse professions, passions, and perspectives, united by a shared mission to preserve the thousand-year heritage of Polish Jews for future generations.

TIME LINE

1944

The Central Committee of Jews in Poland is established. Within it operates a historical commission tasked with collecting memorabilia related to Polish Jews and documenting the Holocaust. It is later transformed into the Central Jewish Historical Commission in Poland.

1946

The first part of the Ringelblum Archive is discovered, having been buried by members of the Oneg Shabbat group shortly before the liquidation of the Warsaw Ghetto

1947

The Central Jewish Historical Commission in Poland is transformed into the Jewish Historical Institute.

1950

The second part of the Ringelblum Archive is discovered. It is currently owned by the Association and is partially displayed in the permanent exhibition at the Emanuel Ringelblum Jewish Historical Institute.

1950

The Association of the Jewish Historical Institute is established, providing a legal framework for the Jewish Historical Institute.

1951

Official registration of the Association of the Jewish Historical Institute.

1968

During the state-led antisemitic campaign, the authorities of the Polish People's Republic attempt to liquidate the Jewish Historical Institute. Although the institution survives, many of its employees are forced to leave Poland.

1993

The Association initiates the idea of establishing the Museum of the History of Polish Jews.

1994

The Jewish Historical Institute is separated from the Association and becomes a state research institution overseen by the Ministry of Culture and Art.

1999

The Ringelblum Archive is entered into UNESCO's Memory of the World Register.

2005

The Association, the City of Warsaw, and the Ministry of Culture sign an agreement to establish the POLIN Museum of the History of Polish Jews.

2013

The Jan Jagielski Grant Committee is established and the Association's Grant Program is launched.

2014

Opening of the permanent exhibition at the POLIN Museum of the History of Polish Jews.

2017

Opening of a new permanent exhibition at the Jewish Historical Institute titled *What We Could Not Shout to the World*.

2021

Creation of a memorial site marking the discovery of the first and second parts of the Ringelblum Archive at 28 Nowolipki Street in Warsaw.

2022

The Association of the Jewish Historical Institute joins as a co-organizer of the Warsaw Ghetto Uprising Medal, awarded since 1993 by the Association of Jewish Combatants and Victims of World War II.

2023

Unveiling of a symbolic grave honoring the members of the Oneg Shabbat group.

2025

Establishment of the Marian Turski "Thou Shalt Not Be Indifferent" Fund, supporting organizations that combat discrimination. The Association also establishes the Marek Edelman Award for individuals working to counter antisemitism in Poland.



CORE AREAS OF ACTIVITY



POLIN Museum of the History of Polish Jews

The POLIN Museum presents the thousand-year history of the Jewish community in Poland through a narrative, interactive core exhibition, temporary exhibitions, and a wide-ranging educational and cultural program. As the initiator and co-founder of the Museum, the Association remains a key partner and supports its programming by raising funds for its activities.

Emanuel Ringelblum Jewish Historical Institute

The Institute focuses on the preservation and promotion of the material heritage of Polish Jews, with particular emphasis on the Underground Archive of the Warsaw Ghetto—the Ringelblum Archive—listed on UNESCO’s Memory of the World Register. It carries out digitization of the Association’s collections, genealogical research, and scholarly initiatives that expand knowledge of Jewish history and culture in Poland. The Institute serves as a workplace for researchers and is visited by individuals seeking information about their family histories. The Association makes its collections available to the Institute and provides the historic building of the former Main Judaica Library and Institute of Jewish Studies at 3/5 Tłomackie Street in Warsaw.

Grant Program

Established by the Association in 2013, the Grant Program supports projects that promote, document, and preserve the memory of the history and culture of Polish Jews and protect their heritage. It engages local communities, institutions, organizations, and activists throughout Poland. The program is run by the Jan Jagielski Grant Committee. To date, more than 300 projects have been implemented in 70 towns and cities.

Marian Turski “Thou Shalt Not Be Indifferent” Fund

Established in 2025, the Fund aims to preserve the memory of Marian Turski (1926–2025)—a Holocaust survivor, historian, journalist, and long-time chair of the Association—who called for refusing indifference to all forms of discrimination. Each year, through a competitive process, the Fund supports initiatives and programs that combat discrimination in Poland.

Other Activities

Each year, together with the Association of Jewish Combatants and Victims of World War II, we award the Warsaw Ghetto Uprising Medal, honoring individuals distinguished for commemorating the history of Polish Jews, preserving the memory of the Holocaust, and building Polish–Jewish dialogue. In 2025, the Marek Edelman Award was also established to recognize individuals who have made outstanding contributions to combating antisemitism in Poland.

POLIN MUSEUM OF THE HISTORY OF POLISH JEWS

Since its founding, the Museum has enjoyed international recognition, receiving numerous awards for its programming to promote the history of Polish Jews and its execution of projects to build an open and tolerant society. The heart of the Museum is the core exhibition, prepared by an international team of academics and designers working under the auspices of the Association. It teaches visitors about the thousand-year history of Jews in Poland.


10 YEARS OF POLIN MUSEUM

In 2024 the Museum celebrated the 10th anniversary of the opening of the core exhibition, co-organizing with the Association a series of special events. During the opening ceremony, Association Vice President Marian Turski, a Holocaust survivor, quoted from a Jewish partisan song:

We are here. Mir zenen do

referring to the uninterrupted presence – despite the Holocaust and all other adversity – of Jews in Poland. These words became the theme for the 10th anniversary commemorations.

More than 100 special guests took part in the events, held Sept. 27–29, including representatives of the founders, the creators of the Museum, numerous key donors from Poland and around the world, and partners, friends and people who work with POLIN. More than 10,000 people took part in the public jubilee program. It was an outstanding opportunity to celebrate the success of POLIN Museum, and its unquestioned position as one of the most important Jewish museums in the world, among friends.

As part of the changes to the core exhibition, the Museum introduced a new arrangement of the final space in the Postwar Years gallery, devoted to contemporary Jewish life in Poland.

The space takes the form of a symbolic home, showing the Mikołaj Grynberg film *Who we are* – in which the director asks Polish Jews about their identity and their relationship to Poland. The film echoes a Wilhelm Sasnal painting that addresses Poland as a site of the Holocaust.

CULTURAL ACTIVITIES

The year 2024 was rich in cultural events. The 12th Warsaw Ghetto Uprising Campaign commemorated the 81st anniversary of the battle, highlighting the role of women in the fighting. The 10th anniversary edition of the POLIN Award was also presented, and the seventh POLIN Music Festival included the premiere of a concerto by Alex Weiser, inspired by the poetry of Kadia Molodowsky.

ACQUISITIONS FOR THE COLLECTION

In 2024 the Museum collection was enriched with the work *Bonded Hearts Club* by the Israeli artist Galia Armeland, which addresses themes of memory, identity and Jewish heritage in the context of the trauma of the Holocaust. Three works by Leopold Gottlieb, an outstanding painter from the École de Paris, were also acquired.

TEMPORARY EXHIBITIONS

In January the temporary exhibition *Around Us a Sea of Fire: The Fate of Jewish Civilians During the Warsaw Ghetto Uprising* closed after garnering outstanding reviews and drawing in a record 136,000 visitors.

In May, the Museum launched the temporary exhibition *(post)JEWISH... Shtetl Opatów Through the Eyes of Mayer Kirshenblatt*. This was an outstanding effort to restore the memory of the Jewish community of Opatów, which before the war made up 60 percent of the population. Visitors' guide to this world was Mayer Kirshenblatt (1916-2009), an amateur painter who left Poland before World War II as a teenager, and at the age of 73 began to paint scenes from his childhood from memory. The exhibition drew great interest, attracting more than 108,000 visitors.

EDUCATIONAL PROJECTS AND PUBLICATIONS

As part of the Global Educational Outreach Program (GEOP), the Museum organized two international conferences: *The Accidental Metropolis? Jewish Łódź from 1800 to present and From Shtetl to Post – Jewish Town*. The events drew a total of more than 150 scholars from around the world. The program also included workshops in partnership with the University of Graz, in which researchers from Austria, France, Germany, Israel and Poland took part.

Additionally, the Museum began work on the English-language edition of the book *A Question of Character: Female fighters from the Warsaw Ghetto and on translating Havi Dreifuss Warsaw Ghetto – The End into Polish*. Important academic and popular works were also published, including Anna Bikont's book *Not the end, not the beginning* (Nie koniec, nie początek).

INTERNATIONAL PROJECTS

In 2024, a delegation of POLIN Museum and the Association visited New York to meet with donors and partners, and to discuss future partnerships with American institutions. The agenda also included two cultural events: the American premiere of Mikołaj Grynberg's film *Proof of Identity* at the Center for Jewish History, including a discussion with the filmmaker, and a concert by the Ger Mandolin Orchestra featuring the premiere of Marcin Masecki's *Ger Suite* at the Museum of Jewish Heritage as part of the New York Jewish Book Festival. The two events drew a combined audience of more than 500 people.

The Emanuel Ringelblum Jewish Historical Institute

The Jewish Historical Institute is a world-leading research center dedicated to documenting and promoting the history of Jews in Poland and Central and Eastern Europe.

The Institute is also home to Poland's largest team of scholars working on Jewish heritage and the Yiddish language. Various divisions research and work with the materials in the archive, the library and the art collection, most of which are the property of the Association.

Thanks to the support and the long-term engagement of the U.S. – based Taube Philanthropies, year by year the Association supports the Institute's statutory activity, encompassing exhibitions, archiving, digitization, renovation of the building, genealogical research, education, online access and communication: all to promote and preserve the history of Jews in Poland.

COLLECTIONS

In 2024 the Archives Department of the Jewish Historical Institute added 9,058 records to its database, responded to 1,200 e-mail inquiries and carried out 850 archival searches.

As part of a long-term translation project, the 10th volume of the English-language edition of the Ringelblum Archive was published. *Jewish Council in Warsaw 1939–1943* was edited by Marta Janczewska and Eleonora Bergman. The volume describes the operations of the Judenrat in Warsaw during those years. This publication, which contains almost all the documents of the institution that have been preserved, is an extraordinary source of knowledge about how the body functioned during the Holocaust. With support from the Association, the Institute continues its work on translating further volumes of the Ringelblum Archive, making them available to a broader, international audience.

THE RINGELBLUM ARCHIVE IN AUSTRALIA

In November, a new temporary exhibition opened in the Melbourne Holocaust Museum, titled *Underground: The Hidden Archive of the Warsaw Ghetto*. Prepared by the Jewish Historical Institute in cooperation with the Association, NSDokumentationszentrum München and the Melbourne Holocaust Museum, the exhibition presented the Oneg Szabat group and the Ringelblum Archive, showing daily life in the Warsaw Ghetto and the effort to rescue the memory of the Holocaust.

After the success of the exhibition in Munich in 2023, this was another edition of the project presented to an international audience. The Association established this initiative: it financed the exhibition catalog, and organized a visit to Melbourne and Sydney during which Association Operations Director Michał Majewski took part in the exhibition opening. This was an opportunity to strengthen cooperation with the Australian Society of Polish Jews and Their Descendants, as well as for meetings and lectures on the Institute's activities.



DIGITALIZACJA

The Digitization Department prepared 7,895 items for inclusion in the Main Jewish Library, performed 107,096 archival scans and worked on 1,847 items. The objects included historical memorabilia, archives, library materials and photographs.

EDUCATION

Since 2009 the Education Department has organized trainings on the Holocaust aimed at teachers, other educators and local leaders. The seminars – the Summer and Winter Academy – are based on the exhibition *What We've Been Unable to Shout Out to the World*, devoted to the Oneg Szabat group and the Warsaw Ghetto Underground Archive. Participants take part in lectures, discussions, meetings with experts, curated tours and training on the Delet educational portal.

In 2024, 60 educators took part in the Summer and Winter Academy.

GENEALOGY

For more than 25 years, the Genealogy Department has researched the history of Jewish families from Poland. It helps fill in the gaps of fragmentary family accounts, finding the traces of ancestors and bringing together relatives living in various parts of the world.

In 2024 the department responded to 1,788 queries and carried out extensive genealogical research.

03. The Grants Program

SMALL PROJECTS, BIG CHANGE

Each year, the Jan Jagielski Grants Committee, part of the Association of the Jewish Historical Institute, announces the winning applications in the Association's Grants Program. This initiative supports local activities to preserve the memory of Jewish history and culture and to protect their heritage. NGOs, foundations, cultural and educational institutions and informal groups working with selected organizations are eligible for the grants. The projects must be carried out within the contemporary or historical borders of Poland.

The program shows that even small initiatives can lead to great changes. Our support allows local activists to carry out projects that strengthen dialog, protect memory and preserve Jewish heritage for future generations.

PROTECTION OF CEMETERIES AND BURIAL SITES

Many projects in the Program have carried out documentation, inventory and restoration of Jewish cemeteries in various parts of the country. These activities have included both fieldwork – cleaning up tombs, cataloging and digitizing matsevahs – as well as work on databases, digital maps and educational materials.

Several projects combined preservation work with local social engagement: volunteers, schoolchildren and residents got involved in the cleanup and research work. These activities have helped rescue the physical traces of a Jewish presence in Poland from oblivion, as well as strengthening historical consciousness and intercultural dialog in local communities. The initiatives in Tarnów, Osięciny, Trzebinia and Bychawa, which combined documentation work with education and commemoration of long-lost communities, were particularly significant.

EDUCATIONAL ACTIVITIES

Our educational projects focused primarily on work with children and youth, developing historical consciousness and building attitudes of openness and tolerance. They used diverse didactic methods – from workshops and museum lessons through interactive scavenger hunts, educational walking tours and multimedia projects.

The subjects included the daily life and culture of Polish Jews, the fate of women during World War II, the history of local communities and the contemporary significance of memory of the Holocaust. The distinguishing element of this group of projects was bringing together traditional historical education with contemporary digital tools, which enhanced the accessibility of the materials and participants' engagement. These actions helped cement knowledge of our common heritage and develop the younger generation's social competences.

DISSEMINATION AND EDUCATIONAL ACTIVITIES

The largest group in the program comprised dissemination projects: festivals, concerts, shows, exhibitions, urban walks and public discussions. Their common goal was to introduce Jewish culture and history a large, diverse audience, both in large cities and in smaller locales. These projects combined artistic activities with historical and social education, using theater, music, film and contemporary art as tools for reflection on memory and identity.

Many events marked anniversaries, including the commemoration of the 80th anniversary of the liquidation of the Łódź Ghetto, or had a local nature, stressing the multicultural past of towns and cities including Białystok, Tarnów, Mszana Dolna and Katowice. The diverse forms and broad reach of this category of projects meant that they played a significant role in spreading knowledge of the history of Jews in Poland and building social engagement in protecting their heritage.

PUBLISHING


Projects in this category comprised documentation, research and dissemination. They included translation and editing of historical sources (including memorial books), academic and album publications, exhibition catalogs and expansion of the database of Holocaust victims.

Their common goal was to record the results of research and conservation activities in the form of permanent records that will serve both specialists and others interested in the subject. Publications created as part of the program are an important contribution to the development of knowledge on the history and culture of Jews in Poland and in promoting best practices in documentation and scientific work.



AN EXCEPTIONAL GIFT FOR THE MUSEUM'S 10TH ANNIVERSARY

During the Museum's 10th anniversary events, Gregory Jankilevitsch, a Distinguished Benefactor and long-term friend of POLIN Museum, announced his intention to support the institution in coming years.

The agreement he signed with the Association calls for the donation of PLN 10 million in 2027-2037, placing him among the largest and most distinguished donors to POLIN Museum.

This gift, received by the Association, will allow the Museum to finance many key projects in the coming years.

WE BID FAREWELL TO DISTINGUISHED BENEFACTORS

With great sorrow, in 2024 we bid farewell to two Distinguished Benefactors of POLIN Museum – two Częstochowans who played a key role in the creation of the Museum.



ZYGMUNT ROLAT, BORN. 1930

A Holocaust survivor, philanthropist and one of three founding donors of POLIN Museum, for years Zygmunt Rolat was engaged in building Polish-Jewish dialog and commemorating the history of Częstochowa. He was the patron of many Jewish-related events in Poland, including the Singer's Warsaw Jewish Culture Festival and the Jewish Culture Festival in Kraków. As a friend and donor of POLIN Museum, he was also a longtime member of the Museum Council and co-founder of the North American Support Committee, later American Friends of POLIN Museum, which continues the mission initiated by Zygmunt Rolat. An outstanding individual, who left behind a rich legacy.



RICHARD "RICKY" PARASOL, BORN 1935

Ricky Parasol a Holocaust survivor, was an engineer, entrepreneur, investor and philanthropist. After World War II, his arduous journey as an orphan refugee led him out of Poland, across the continent of Europe, to Israel and after a few years to the United States. There he began engineering studies at California Polytechnic State University (Cal Poly). After completing his studies, he worked for many years as an engineer, and in 1964 began to invest in apartments in San Francisco. He achieved great success in both his professional and his personal life. Richard's energy, kindness and determination were infectious and inspiring.

€1 MILLION FOR EDUCATION

On March 28, 2024, the Museum signed an agreement with the government of Germany, which donated €1 million for the Remembrance, Education, Inclusion program.

This gift was the fruit of efforts initiated by Marian Turski, which the Association supported. The funds will allow the creation of a program for almost 70,000 participants, with online materials that more than 1 million people will use.

SUPPORT FOR THE JEWISH HISTORICAL INSTITUTE

The Taube Family Foundation has supported the Institute for years, financing projects including the translation of the Ringelblum Archive and renovation work. In September 2024, representatives of the Taube foundation joined a group of POLIN Museum donors to visit the Jewish Historical Institute during the celebrations of POLIN Museum's 10-year anniversary. The guests met with the Institute's new director, Michał Trębacz, and visited the exhibition and the repository that holds the priceless Ringelblum Archive.

At the end of 2024 the Taube Family Foundation announced continuing support: \$750,000 in 2025-2030.

FRIENDS OF POLIN MUSEUM: CHARITY AUCTION

On Oct. 16, during the 10th anniversary celebrations, POLIN Museum hosted a charity auction organized by the Association in cooperation with leading auction house Desa Unicum, under the media patronage of *Vogue Polska*. The goal of the auction was to raise funds for POLIN Museum's programming. The items included 18 works by artists including Wilhelm Sasnal, Rafał Olbiński, Tomasz Poznysz and Tadeusz Rolke. The auction raised almost PLN 200,000.

Additionally, the event itself received widespread coverage in local and national media, stressing the Association's role as a co-founder of POLIN Museum and an active supporter of its mission.

POLIN MUSEUM IN NEW YORK

In December, two events were held to promote the Museum: a screening of a Mikołaj Grynberg film in the Center for Jewish History and a concert by Marcin Masecki and the Ger Mandolin Orchestra in the Museum of Jewish Heritage. American Friends of POLIN Museum was a partner of the events, and also organized a special reception for donors. The meetings provided a perfect opportunity to renew relationships and conversations about the Museum's future.

Last year the Association's financial situation remained at a very good level. Funds were raised that guaranteed stability and ensure funding for joint projects with partners in the coming years.



THE ASSOCIATION'S FINANCES IN 2024


At the end of 2024, the Association had funds of PLN 31,741,000, an increase of almost PLN 850,000 from the beginning of the year.




REVENUE AND EXPENSES

EXPENSES BY CATEGORY (2024)




REVENUE BY CATEGORY (2024)



THE ENDOWMENT FUND IN 2024

The Endowment Fund was established in 2022 by a decision of the Annual Meeting of the Association's members and designated for long-term investments, with the returns to finance the Association's statutory goals. It is managed by mBank and the Franklin Templeton investment fund, based on an investment policy developed by the Association Finance Committee and accepted by the Annual Meeting.



STRUCTURE OF THE INVESTMENT PORTFOLIO



mBank is the Polish unit of Germany's Commerzbank, which operated in 2000-2013 as the online banking brand, before becoming the official name of the entire group. Today the lender offers a full range of retail, corporate, investment and private banking services in Poland, Czechia and Slovakia, as well as leasing and factoring services through various units. mBank is Poland's leading online bank.

05. Other income and expenditures

Income designated for the Association's statutory activity, interest on bank deposits, costs of foreign-exchange conversion and other expenditures not classified elsewhere, including transfers between categories.


